

# **Speaker for March**

Laurence Melton, Emeritus Professor, Faculty of Science, University of Auckland will present the March Talk.

His subject will be Precision genetic engineering (CRISPR), one of the most important scientific breakthroughs of the 21st century so far. It has the potential of curing many serious diseases such as cystic fibrosis, Huntington's disease, haemophilia. Cures for sickle cell disease and thalassaemia have already been developed.

Further, it is being used to breed crops and animals to deal with climate change (e.g. cows that fart less, produce more milk and cope with increasing temperatures).

# Timeless taonga! Only known customary sail Te Rā on loan from **British Museum**

Many of you will have seen this sail but worth a trip to the Auckland Museum if you haven't.

A team from the Royal Society Te Apārangi Marsden fund project, was created to become the first team to systematically study or document the sail They said it had been a long process to get

it to Aotearoa, but "for us, bringing Te Rā home, it's

just amazing".

Made of harakeke, along with weka and kererū feathers, and a tiny piece of dog hide – a native kurī used only in kākahu (garments) for those of the highest ranking. No tribal provenance was found, so the piece will be returned to the British Museum.



It was a mystery how it came to be in British hands. It was first recorded by the British Museum in 1890, but had likely been in storage there a lot longer.

The team speculated that it came from Captain James Cook's collection in the 1700s, "but we can't say for sure". It is thought that it came to have been gifted to Tupaia, the Polynesian navigator on the ship.

From what is understood so far, it was not an across-ocean sail, but rather used on waka travelling the coastline.
