Hi from the Baltics,

I am writing from the wilds of Macedonia. Actually, not all that wild. Today we are in the fascinatingly beautiful city of Ohrid. It is full of ancient buildings, some in ruins and some still being used. This morning, we visited the church of St Sophia, which served as a mosque under the Ottomans, survived communism and is now an orthodox Christian church. The church has amazing icons but we were advised not to take photos, so I shall just have to remember them.

Ohrid is situated on an enormous lake called Lake Ohrid that borders Albania and North Macedonia. So much history between the two countries and I am planning to read up a bit more about the Baltics when I get home. We started our bus tour in Zagreb and end in Sofia. It amazes me how much countries change within a few kilometres of the border and there are many lovely roads and bridges

Amazing to think that while New Zealand was busy developing its flora and fauna this part of the world was watching civilizations come and go.

In Albania we visited a relatively newly developed archaeological site where the plan is to knock down a number of houses to expand and develop a fairly recently discovered site which goes back before Roman times. They take their history seriously.

There are many empty houses, partly because of recent wars and partly because the young all go to the

EU to work if they can. Some countries report there are more citizens living outside the country than within. So much of the history involves fighting and conquering. A bit like today I guess except that our weapons are so much more vicious.

It has been encouraging to discover how many people on this tour belong to and enjoy the benefits of U3A. We must do our best to encourage more members and keep our organisation viable.

Speaker for June is Sir Richard Faull

Sir Richard FAULL KNZM, BMedSc, MB, ChB, PhD, DSc, FRSNZ

Sir Richard Faull is a Distinguished Professor and Director of the Centre for Brain Research at the University of Auckland.

During his 45 years at the University, he has established an international reputation for his research studies on the normal and diseased human brain (Alzheimer's, Huntington's, Parkinson's and epilepsy) and with the generous support of families, has established an international leading Human Brain Bank to promote worldwide research on human brain diseases. His research group has revolutionised our knowledge of the human brain by showing that contrary to dogma, stem cells are still present in the adult human brain and have the potential to make new brain cells and repair the brain throughout life.

His contributions to research on the human brain have been recognized by his appointment as a Fellow of the Royal Society of New Zealand (1998) and he was awarded: the Liley Medal by the Health Research Council of New Zealand in 2005; New Zealand's highest scientific award, the Rutherford Medal, in 2007 by the Royal Society of New Zealand for outstanding contributions in science; and, received the Supreme Award in the 2010 World Class New Zealand Awards. In 2012 he was appointed Distinguished Professor at the University of Auckland and awarded a knighthood by the Queen in 2016 for his contributions to brain research.



The Speaker for July is Peter Morgan

Pete Morgan, who farms 265 hectares in the Waikato with his wife Ann, is one of a new generation of farmers who are passionate about spearheading a proactive and tech-friendly approach to the changing agricultural landscape.

Nominated as an Agri Star by UBCO, Pete integrates GPS tracking, climate-modelling and data analysis with cutting edge "field tech" such as virtual fencing systems and electric utility bikes.

Pete envisions the future of farming anchored in sustainability and meeting the evolving demands of climate change and societal expectations.



Perhaps of interest

This is the tomb of Rudolph Nureyev, the Great Russian Dancer, at the Russian Cemetery in Sainte-Geneviève-des-Bois near Paris, France. The tomb is designed to look like a rug, but it is entirely made of bronze and glass. Rudolf Nuréyev was an important dancer born in the Soviet Union and considered one of the greatest dancers of the 20th century.

It's not a canvas, it's not a mantle, it's not a rug. It's a spectacular mosaic of colours resembling the kilim, the hand made rug that covered the coffins of wanderers. The realism achieved in its shape, folds, colour and texture makes it one of the main tourist attractions of this cemetery.



It was designed by his friend Ezio Frigerio, whom he met after one of his performances in the ballet Romeo and Juliet.
