President's Piece – December 2024



Speaker for December is Laurence Melton

A Christmas in Marburg

From 1971 to 1973 we lived in the fairy-tale town of Marburg in West Germany. I was working as a postdoctoral fellow at Philipps University, which had seen so many famous scholars including Otto Hahn and the Brothers Grimm.

The cold war was on and there were tanks and soldiers in the fields with jet fighters overhead. Outside of the towns and cities there was no speed limit on the roads. It was an exciting time. The food was tasty and hearty. German white wine was the best in the world. Christmas was a special time with Christmas markets and lots of good things to eat.

BIO for Laurence Melton. An MSc in Chemistry at the University of Auckland was followed by a PhD in carbohydrate chemistry at Simon Fraser University in Canada and a Postdoc at Marburg University, West Germany.

He was Professor of Food Science at the University of Otago, doing research on Fruit and Vegetables and then Professor of Food Chemistry at the University of Auckland working on how molecules interact to give food its structure and texture. He has also worked as a scientist for

Unilever in England and for the CSIRO in Victoria. Until recently he was an Editor for *Food Chemistry*, the world's leading food research journal.

Laurence is currently an Emeritus Professor at the University of Auckland.

He was a long-distance runner, including completing the New York marathon and qualifying for the Boston marathon. Hobbies now include walking and reading everything from Borges to Zizek.


Citizen Kane regularly features in the top five list of films ever made.

"Principles of Applied Conservatism"

Matthew Hooton will summarise the main findings of his recent PhD thesis (under examination) on principles of conservatism, drawn from ontology, epistemology, ethics, metaethics and political philosophy.

He will then apply them to the controversy over the taniwha Horotiu in 2011, at which time he was an advisor to the Independent Māori Statutory Board, and consider how they may have assisted the board and Prime Minister John Key manage the issue differently
