The Hundertwasser Art Centre with Wairau Māori Art Gallery celebrates painter, architect, ecologist and visionary Friedensreich Hundertwasser and contemporary Māori artists. The Austrian New



Zealand artist Hundertwasser, who lived in New Zealand from 1973 to 2000, was first and foremost a painter but became involved in architecture and environmental activism because of his concerns about the exploitation of natural resources and ruthless urbanisation.

The design of the Hundertwasser Art Centre with Wairau Māori Art Gallery was based on initial sketches by Hundertwasser himself thirty years ago. In this presentation, Dr Joost de Bruin, Director of the Hundertwasser Art Centre, will reflect on Hundertwasser's legacy and how it is represented in the Hundertwasser Art Centre with Wairau Māori Art Gallery. He will discuss Hundertwasser's vision of the 'Five Skins' that articulates how we are all defined by our bodies, our

clothes, our homes, our identity and the earth on which we live.

Looking Back

The first meeting of u3a Remuera for 2025 was held in February and was well attended by 83 members and 6 visitors. This was the largest attendance in 2½ years. We welcomed 4 new members, increasing total membership to 139.

Each of the 16 study group convenors gave a short presentation outlining the scope of their group's interest, the topics they cover and the format of their group meetings. A new group was introduced, "Digital Know-How," which members were invited to join. All u3a members were encouraged to participate in one or more study groups as a place to socialise, a chance to participate, and to learn something new to keep their mind active.

The main speaker for the morning was Matthew Hooton, one of New Zealand's most experienced and best-connected strategic consultants, policy-advisors and lobbyists. He is well known for his regular column in the NZ Herald and articles in Metro and The Australian. He covered several political topics and issues relating to New Zealand. These included:

• The dire concern of an increasing fiscal debt, currently 40% of GDP, following many years of government deficits, with annual interest payments of \$10 billion to service that debt. Unless there is significant change to government borrowing, New Zealand could be in default by

2040. The current government aims to address this issue by promoting economic growth. However, he pointed out, growth needs to be substantial around 6% annually to redress the fiscal debt.

- He was critical of New Zealand's school education system which has significantly deteriorated over the years. "The New Zealand secondary school NCEA qualification is not worth anything" he said.
- Internationally, New Zealand is aligning itself more closely with the United States, Australia, the United Kingdom and NATO. To remain a credible partner, New Zealand would be expected to significantly increase its spending on defence. At present this is not affordable. The threat of Chinese expansionism in the South Pacific is topical with the Cook Islands / China deal about to be signed.

He concluded by saying New Zealand needs a bold initiative from one of the major political parties. It will take courageous decisions to make significant and immediate economic and educational changes to address the long-term issues facing the country. Sadly, there is no clear evidence of this at present.
