Looking Back

James Duncan, MOTAT's enthusiastic Tram Project Manager, entertained us with the first of three talks about the arrival and development of Auckland's electric trams. He described the tram system as the best public transport system Auckland has ever had. It served the city for 54 years from 1902 until 1956.



Auckland was founded as a city in 1871. At that time most city dwellers had to walk wherever they wanted to go and therefore had to live close to the city centre. During 1880's, horse drawn trams were introduced, however owing to the hilly topography they had limitations and, at times, required additional horse power provided by "Hill Boys."

Landowners influenced the introduction of electric trams to the growing city as this enabled development of suburban housing estates. In 1899 the Auckland Electric Tram Company was founded as electricity was rapidly being introduced to cities around the world. A steam driven

electricity generator was built at the bottom of Hobson Street in August 1901, and over the course of the next year 43 trams comprising three different designs were purchased.

On 24th November 1902, Sir John Logan Campbell launched the new service from the city centre to Ponsonby. Sunday tram services were introduced a while later following a close vote of councillors. Christmas Eve of 1903 was marked by a runaway tram following a brake failure in Kingsland. 3 people died in the accident.

By 1905 with the growth of the tram service, additional trams were required leading to a 1906 ultimatum from the Auckland City Council and subsequent manufacture of locally built trams. In 1918 the service transported 44 million passengers, but by 1919, profitability of the service was in decline and the tramway service was acquired by the Auckland City Council for 1.2 million.
